There was a very limited consciousness around Quality Management at PEC in 2011. But through extensive, sometime lengthy discussions amongst staff about processes and procedures a common understanding for the necessity of a living and working Quality Management System developed. Presentations of results to staff members contributed positively to the Quality consciousness at PEC.


Since then a Quality Manager and an Occupational Health and Safety Manager as well as campus representatives have been appointed. The idea of the workshop is to share with industry peers on what can be done to improve performance and competitiveness of companies and impact the bottom line.




Welcoming SAICA Official





Higher Education and Training HIV / AIDS Programme

s a Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institution resorting under Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) we were requested to activate our campuses as part of the HEAIDS activation project for Universities and Colleges. This activation means that as an institution we will be running HEAIDS sanctioned programmes.

The activation dates for PE College are March 2015, May 2015 and August 2015. The programmes that will be campaigned on these dates are as follows:

March 2015 was the "First Things First" campaign.

This is an HIV counselling and testing for students and staff to know their status as the basis for caring for themselves, their loved ones, and the broader community. It is a necessary step towards treatment, care and support and preventing new infections.

May 2015 will be the "Brothers for Life" campaign.

This is Medical Male Circumcision undertaken at institutional facilities or off campus, and promoted as part of a healthy sex life that includes being faithful to a single partner, avoiding alcohol abuse, and wearing condoms.

August 2015 will be the "Zazi (Women empowerment)" campaign.

This is a women and girls campaign that celebrates the strength and potential of South African women. It reminds you of your inner strength, encourages you to pull yourself towards yourself and helps you to identify an abusive relationship. It addresses gender inequalities that drive HIV risk factors, like gender based violence and transactional sex, through mobilization and media advocacy.

All these campaigns are also supplanted with various other clinical services.
